I Don't Want to See Any More Dead

"I don't want to see any more dead," stated Officer Luke Lock of the Penn Township Police Department at the Penn Township Drug Awareness program held on Monday, May 24, 2004, in the Penn-Trafford High School Auditorium. This feeling was the motivation for Officer Lock's taking the initiative to organize the program. He wanted to educate area residents about the growing drug problem in the community.

The Penn Township Drug Awareness program started with Valerie Turkowski telling a

personal story of the loss of her 18-year-old son who was using drugs and eventually committed suicide on October 16, 2003. This isn't a story of an inner-city family; the Turkowski's are local Penn Township residents. While the family did all they could to help their son, they could not prevent the tragic ending.

Officer Lock stated that the arrests for drugs rose approximately 28% from 2002 - 2003 and that he expects the statistics to show an increase of the same amount between 2003 - 2004. Drugs found in the township aren't limited to tobacco, alcohol, and marijuana, but also include heroin and crystal meth.

While it's hard to believe that heroin is prevalent in our community, it is. The heroin of today is easier to use; needles aren't needed to administer the drug. Plus, "stamps" of heroin are surprisingly cheap; just about \$20. That \$20 you give your child for a weekend of fun, that you think is for a movie and popcorn, instead could easily be going to buy drugs.

And, yes, heroin is still as addictive as it used to be. Drug dealers often target relatively well-off communities like Penn Township and Murrysville because of the amount of disposable income the kids have to spend. Chances are that if they get a kid who has money hooked, the drug dealer's business (and profits) will increase because, chances are, the kid won't have a problem getting more money to support his or her habit.

I Don't Want to See - continued

Having drugs in the township is not a problem limited to parents of school-age children. It is a community problem! Increased drugs in the township can lead to an increase in crimes such as burglaries, robberies, thefts, and driving while impaired. It is up to all of us to take a stand and fight to keep our children and township safe.

Also speaking at the program were two young men battling drug addiction, who told their personal stories of trying to fight their addiction and turn their lives around, and three speakers from various local organizations that treat drug use problems, Southwestern Pennsylvania Health Services, Gateway Rehabilitation Center, and Young Overcomers United (Y.O.U.).

Lots of help is available to kids, parents, and other individuals who get mixed up in drugs, but in all cases the first step needs to be recognizing that a problem exists.

As stressed by various speakers at the Penn Township Drug Awareness program, depression often leads kids towards using drugs. While the drug may provide a temporary fix to depression, it just worsens the depression in the end.

Watch for sign of depression in those you love. Depression is very treatable with therapy and prescription medicine.

Symptoms of Depression

- Appearance - sad face, slow movements, unkempt look
- Unhappy feelings - feeling sad, hopeless, discouraged, or listless
- Negative thoughts - "I'm a failure," "I'm no good," "No one cares about me."
- Reduced activity - "I just sit around and mope," "Doing anything is just too much of an effort."
- Reduced concentration
- People problems - "I don't want anybody to see me," "I feel so lonely."
- Guilt and low self-esteem - "It's all my fault," "I should be punished."



- Physical problems - sleeping problems, weight loss or gain, decreased sexual interest, or headaches
- Suicidal thoughts or wishes - "I'd be better off dead," "I wonder if it hurts to die."

Also, watch your those you love for signs of drug use.

Signs of Drug Use - Watch List for Parents

- Changes in friends
 - Negative changes in school work, missing school, or declining grades
 - Increased secrecy about possessions or activities
 - Use of incense, room deodorant, or perfume to hide smoke or chemical odors
 - Subtle changes in conversations with friends, e.g. more secretive, using "coded" language
 - Change in clothing choices, new fascination with clothes that highlight drug use
 - Increase in borrowing money
 - Evidence of drug paraphernalia such as pipes, rolling papers, etc.
 - Evidence of use of inhalant products (such as hair spray, nail polish, correction fluid, and other common household products); rags and paper bags are sometimes used as accessories
 - Bottles of eye drops, which may be used to mask bloodshot eyes or dilated pupils
 - New use of mouthwash or breath mints to cover up the smell of alcohol
 - Missing prescription drugs, especially narcotics and mood stabilizers
- Finally, as stated during the program, "Your house isn't a democracy. You need to be the parent."
- Ask your child questions about where he or she is going, doing, and spending time.
 - Set limits and consequences, and follow through on them.
 - Talk to your kids and listen to what they are saying.
 - Be a role model.

It's an important issue! Today's kids are our future, and we all want our community to be safe.

It's nice to know the Penn Township Police are there to help. Help them by reporting possible drug activity you may see in your neighborhood.

Officer Lock may conduct additional programs to keep the public aware. Watch for them in your local newspapers.

Talking Trash

Illegally dumping or hauling your trash can be very expensive!

If you dump your trash illegally, you could face a fine of up to \$300. If you don't pay your garbage bill, or if you transport your garbage, you could face a fine up to \$1,000.

Penn Township requires all residents to have mandatory trash pickup. Due to the landfill being in Penn Township and the commissioners' willingness to pass some of the township's revenues from the landfill to the residents, Penn Township's rates for garbage collection are the lowest around.

A quarterly bill for residents is \$20.10. And, this includes **unlimited** pickup plus biweekly recycling.

For senior citizens on a budget, Penn Township offers special discounted rates. Signing up for the senior citizen discount drops your cost per quarter to \$5.73. This plan comes with a limit of two bags or cans per week, one additional large item per week, and bi-weekly recycling.

If needed, seniors can purchase stickers for the additional trash they want to place out for collection. The cost per sticker is \$1.00. Stickers can be bought at the Penn Township Municipal Building.

To be eligible for a senior citizen discount, the resident must be 65 years of age. To sign up, simply come to the Penn Township Municipal Building in Harrison City with a current driver's license to complete a certification form.

Penn Township also provides a free recycling bin to its residents. Recycling bins can be pickup at the Penn Township Municipal Building.

From the Community Development Department

Below is a series of questions asked frequently of the Penn Township Community Development Department and their answers.

Question:

Do I need a permit for my swimming pool?

Answer:

Pools, either permanently fixed or portable, capable of containing a water depth of two or more feet, require a permit. Pools extending four or more feet above the ground do not require a fence provided that the pool has removable or retractable steps or ladders that are removed or retracted at all times when the pool is not in use.

The pool and any structure accessory around the pool need to be located in the side or rear yard. It also need to be located a minimum of 20 feet from any property line.

All in-ground pools require a fence of a minimum of four feet in height. All openings in the fence shall be equipped with gates or doors, and have a spring loaded latch located a minimum of four feet above the adjacent ground, which shall be locked when not in use.

The permit fee for an above ground pool is \$75.00 and \$0.20 per square foot for any deck around the pool. The permit fee for an in-ground pool is \$100.00

Question:

Do I need a building permit to put a storage shed in my yard?

Answer:

Yes, a permit is required for all accessory structures. All sheds and accessory structures must be located in the rear yard. The accessory structure shall not exceed more than 30% the area of the rear yard.

If the side wall of the structure does not exceed 6 feet in height and the structure does not exceed 100 square feet in total floor area, then



the structure may be placed within 5 feet of the side and rear property line.

If the total floor area exceeds 100 square feet, then the structure must be placed within a minimum of 10 feet of the side and rear property line.

Permit fees for sheds and accessory structures are \$50.00 and \$0.20 per square foot.

Question:

Do I need a permit to install a fence around my yard?

Answer:

A permit is not required to install a fence, but there are some conditions that apply.

Fences are allowed to be installed on the property line, but it is strongly suggested that the fence be held back from the property line to ensure that the installation is completely on your property.

In all residential districts, a wall or fence in the rear yard shall not exceed 6 feet in height. Decorative fences in the side or front yard must be at least 50% see-through and a maximum of 4 feet in height, provided that they are at least five feet from any street right-of-way.

If the municipality must perform work within the street right-of-way that requires the removal of a fence, the property owner shall be responsible for the removal and replacement of the same.

Question:

Am I allowed to burn and, if so, when?

Answer:

In residential areas, burning is limited to the burning of paper products, newspaper, and yard waste (excluding leaves, grass, and building materials) between the hours of 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday through Friday and 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon on Saturday (excluding bank holidays). No permit is needed.

Outdoor burning of fires must be controlled in a container or appropriate burning barrel and have an attended water supply or equal extinguishing agent throughout the duration of burning.

Fires must be a minimum of 10 feet from any property line.

Burning of garbage, rubber, tires, paint, animal waste, plastics, diapers, toxic materials, or any

other matter consisting of rubbish, trade waste, refuse, or garbage is not permitted.

All fires must be totally extinguished by 6:00 p.m., so as to ensure that there is no smoke or smoldering of fire.

Outdoor fireplaces and grills used solely for food preparation purposes are exempt from these regulations. Bonfires for amusement purposes shall be permitted only upon the approval of the Penn Township zoning officer.

In agricultural areas, burning is permitted between the hours of 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday (no burning on bank holidays). Burning of building materials, tires, garbage, and rubbish is not permitted.

Question:

My neighbor hasn't cut his grass, what can be done about it?

Answer:

Penn Township has an ordinance that addresses high grass. Grass, weeds, or any vegetation (not edible or planted for some useful or ornamental purpose) shall not exceed a height of 10 inches or throw off any unpleasant or noxious odor.

Penn Township shall give notice to the owner or occupant of any violations of this ordinance, requiring compliance within ten days of the receipt of the notice. Failure to comply with notice may result in the township performing the necessary work at the expense of the owner or occupant, plus an additional 10%. In addition, a violator may be sentenced by the district justice to pay a fine up to \$1,000 plus costs.



From the Tax Collector

2004 Real Estate Taxes

The last day for property owners to pay the Westmoreland County and Penn Township real estate tax at the face amount is June 30, 2004.

Payments postmarked after June 30 and through December 31, 2004 will be accepted at the 10% penalty amount.

2004 School Real Estate Taxes

The Penn-Trafford real estate tax notices will be mailed August 1, 2004. Homeowners and businesses that have not received their tax

statements within seven working days from that date should call Larry Ratkus at the Penn Township tax office at 724-744-1414. In addition, please call the tax office if you believe that you received a tax statement in error, (e.g., it should have been sent to your mortgage company).

The 2% discount period is from August 1, 2004, through September 30, 2004. Payments postmarked after September 30, 2004 through November 30, 2004 will be accepted at the face amount.

Remember that you can always use the after hours mail slot at the tax collector's office to make payments before or after normal business hours. Normal business hours are Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Street Light Assessments

Payments for the Penn Township street light assessment statements are now due through December 31, 2004 at the 5% penalty amount.

Occupational Privilege Taxes

The second quarter payments for the occupational privilege tax for the year 2004 are due by July 31, 2004. All persons who are employed or self-employed, including both resident and non-resident individuals, engaging in an occupation in Penn Township who have earnings of over \$10,000, are liable for this tax.

Employers are required to withhold this tax from all employees regardless of their resident district. Self-employed individuals or businesses that have not received their occupational privilege tax forms should contact the tax office.

This tax is jointly assessed by the Penn Township Commissioners and the Penn-Trafford School District at a rate of \$10.00 per year.

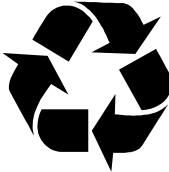

SEPTEMBER 2004**September 11 – Tire, Battery, Scrap Metal, and Appliance Recycling**

PA CleanWays will collect tires, vehicle batteries, scrap metal, and appliances from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on September 11 at the Westmoreland Fairgrounds.

There is a fee to recycle tires -- \$1.75 off-rim for cars and light trucks and \$2.75 on-rim. PA CleanWays members receive a per tire discount. Larger tires are charged by the ply.

There is a \$10 removal fee for freon-containing appliances, unless they have been tagged by a certified technician stating that the freon has been removed.

There is no charge to recycle lead acid batteries, other appliances, or clean scrap metal.

September 18 – Kids Day America/International

Each person in Pennsylvania produces an average of four pounds of HHW each year for a total of about 25,000 tons per year statewide.

Included are items such as old paints and paint-related products, pesticides, pool chemicals, drain cleaners, and degreasers and other car care products.

Such consumer waste products, if carelessly managed can, and frequently do, create environmental and public health hazards.
